## Fr Benjamin writes ...

It may be due to depictions from famous works of art, or because of Hollywood 'blockbuster' portrayals of the Crucifixion, that we often think of it as a crowded event, as the centre of Jerusalem's attention. Certainly, the word "crowds" (hoi polloi) may also legitimately contribute to this assumption. Nevertheless, it could also be interpreted as a largely unnoticed event. "Crowds" was not a word simply to describe numbers, but those who were not disciples of Our Blessed Lord. Most people's attentions would have been focused on the Temple, buying sheep for the Passover sacrifices and preparing for the Passover Feast. Having travelled hundreds, if not thousands of miles, they would not have gone to Pilate's house, which would have made them unclean in the eyes of the authorities, and they most probably would not have gone to the execution ground situated outside the city walls, where criminals were butchered. It was likely to have been low-key, anonymous event; except for those who knew Him, both hoi polloi and disciples.

This is very much foreshadowed by the stories we encounter into today's Sunday Gospel passage, which centre on people trying to be the centre of attention and admiration, and the scene of the Widow's Mite. We have a poor woman who gives no more than a half-penny, and yet her extraordinary gift – all she had to live on – went largely unnoticed. This was in comparison to the many people giving from their wealth. Yet, the Lord noticed. He knew what it was to be the One who gave all, and yet was unknown by all. He knew that a heart given fully to offering itself in love was the greatest treasure to God. Those who wanted their piety noted and admired had already got their reward, but the generosity of the giving of self has an eternal quality to it. We can never know how full the world is of actions which it considers to be insignificant gifts and contributions, yet which fill heaven and earth with the love of God. Just as we cannot know this, so the people of Jerusalem did not know the event which was to be the fulcrum of time and space and the end of everlasting death was taking place outside their walls. Such is humility. Such is the reality of God's little but limitless love.

## 'Jar of meal shall not be spent, jug of oil shall not be emptied'

Elijah the Prophet went off to Sidon. And when he reached the city gate, there was a widow gathering sticks; addressing her he said, 'Please bring me a little water in a vessel for me to drink.' She was setting off to bring it when he called after her. 'Please' he said 'bring me a scrap of bread in your hand.' 'As the Lord your God lives,' she replied 'I have no baked bread, but only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a jug; I am just gathering a stick or two to go and prepare this for myself and my son to eat, and then we shall die.' But Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid, go and do as you have said; but first make a little scone of it for me and bring it to me, and then make some for yourself and for your son. For thus the Lord speaks, the God of Israel:

"Jar of meal shall not be spent, jug of oil shall not be emptied, before the day when the Lord sends rain on the face of the earth."

The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent nor the jug of oil emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah.

## Christ, our high priest, has done away with sin by sacrificing himself

It is not as though Christ had entered a man-made sanctuary which was only modelled on the real one; but it was heaven itself, so that he could appear in the actual presence of God on our behalf. And he does not have to offer himself again and again, like the high priest going into the sanctuary year after year with the blood that is not his own, or else he would have had to suffer over and over again since the world began. Instead of that, he has made his appearance once and for all, now at the end of the last age, to do away with sin by sacrificing himself. Since men only die once, and after that comes judgement, so Christ, too, offers himself only once to take the faults of many on himself, and when he appears a second time, it will not be to deal with sin but to reward with salvation those who are waiting for him.

## This poor widow has put in more than all

In his teaching Jesus said, 'Beware of the scribes who like to walk about in long robes, to be greeted obsequiously in the market squares, to take the front seats in the synagogues and the places of honour at banquets; these are the men who swallow the property of widows, while making a show of lengthy prayers. The more severe will be the sentence they receive.'

He sat down opposite the treasury and watched the people putting money into the treasury, and many of the rich put in a great deal. A poor widow came and put in two small coins, the equivalent of a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, 'I tell you solemnly, this poor widow has put more in than all who have contributed to the treasury; for they have all put in money they had over, but she from the little she had has put in everything she possessed, all she had to live on.'
