Fr Benjamin writes ...

One of the greatest privileges of being a Priest is to have the Blessed Sacrament in a little chapel in the house. In a very real way, the Priest shares a home with Jesus Christ. To be more precise, it is the Priest who shares Christ's home. Every morning the first thing I do is walk to the chapel and kneel before Him. It is a wonderful way of saying 'Good morning'. Last thing at night too, I make sure all is well in the chapel, the sanctuary lamp is lit, and I pray for a quiet and safe night. There are many visits in-between. To share the house with Our Blesses Lord is a huge blessing, and one I would never wish to be without.

Nevertheless, the chapel will be empty next week as the Lord and I go on retreat together. Once a year, a Priest should take one week in quiet contemplation with the Lord. This is an entirely appropriate time of year in which to go on retreat, this First Sunday of Lent, hearing as we do that the Lord Himself retreats into the wilderness for forty days and forty nights. He lived with His heavenly Father in such a concentrated way that it defined Him. This is what should define us, too. This is where we should be most at home, in the presence of God.

Retreats are one way to do this, but there are other ways, such as a commitment to daily prayer; a resolution that a certain period of time will be, come-what-may, spent living in the presence of God. It could be spent reading a passage from the holy gospels or having a prayer corner in the most used room in the house (don't forget to book your week with the statue of the Holy Family if you haven't already done so). The point is to create space and time for God, living with Him so that He may live with you, in your home and in your heart.

The water on which the Ark floated is a type of the baptism which saves you now


Christ himself, innocent though he was, died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life, and, in the spirit, he went to preach to the spirits in prison. Now it was long ago, when Noah was still building that ark which saved only a small group of eight people 'by water', and when God was still waiting patiently, that these spirits refused to believe. That water is a type of the baptism which saves you now, and which is not the washing off of physical dirt but a pledge made to God from a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has entered heaven and is at God's right hand, now that he has made the angels and Dominations and Powers his subjects.

Gospel Mark 1:12-15

Jesus was tempted by Satan, and the angels looked after him

The Spirit drove Jesus out into the wilderness and he remained there for forty days, and was tempted by Satan. He was with the wild beasts, and the angels looked after him.

After John had been arrested, Jesus went into Galilee. There he proclaimed the Good News from God. 'The time has come' he said 'and the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent, and believe the Good News.'

CRIMINAL JUSTICE BILL

Please, please, **please** complete the cards at the back of the Church asking your MP to speak and vote in support of the amendment to the Criminal Justice Bill to lower the abortion time limit to 22 weeks. It is a small step towards saving the lives of unborn babies in this country. The important details to complete are your name and address to verify you are a constituent. Cards can either be posted directly to your MP or returned to the Parish office for posting.

Planned Giving and Gift Aid

"Planned Giving" helps the Parish to manage finances by knowing roughly how much income we will receive each month, to cover expenses such as electricity, gas and maintenance. Planned giving can be by means of regular offerings using numbered envelopes or by Direct Debit.

"Gift Aid" allows the Parish to reclaim from the Government tax which you have already paid (that is 25 pence for every £1 you give to the Church). To claim Gift Aid we must be able to show that the taxpayer authorises us to do so. If you pay UK tax and are willing to Gift Aid, please complete a Gift Aid Declaration form. The office will be contacting by email those who have previously signed GADs but for whom we do not have an updated Gift Aid form. Obviously Gift Aid can make a considerable difference to Parish income without costing parishioners any extra.
